² Aggression refers to physical, emotional, or relational behaviors intended to harm another person

³ Primary psychopathy is characterized by low anxiety and is strongly heritable; secondary psychopathy is characterized by high anxiety and thought to develop in response to environmental adversity.

⁴ However, psychopathy is included in DSM-5 section III (which discusses emerging measures and models); some also consider psychopathy as assessed via the PCL-R equivalent to a clinical diagnosis

⁵ *Limited Prosocial Emotions* is another term for *callous-unemotional traits*, which is sometimes abbreviated "CU traits"
